Course Description: This course is the second of the two-course sequence of

In the first six weeks, each student presents one or two research papers assigned by instructors. In the next six weeks, students are expected to present their own work. Students are encouraged to actively participate in class discussion.

At the end of the semester, students are expected to submit a term paper (15-20 pages) based on independent and original research. This paper is on the topic of students' choice but

should be approved by instructors. At a minimum, the term paper should contain a clear statement of a research question, with articulation of why it is important, and how you intend to go about answering it. The rest of the paper should be used to summarize what the existing literature has to say about the research question and describe the data or theory you intend to apply. This does not have to be a complete paper (although if it is, that is wonderful). But it should be focused enough so that it provides students a strong foundation from which to build.

III. Course Content and Tentative Schedule

A list of research topics will be distributed at the beginning of the course. Students will be divided by research topics and present each assigned paper.

Tentative topics include the following:

- 1. Digital economy
- 2. AI and internal labor markets
- 3. Public organization
- 4. Growth and decline of firms
- 5. Behavioral organizational economics

V. Course Policy

- b. <u>Unauthorized Collaboration on Out-of-Class Projects</u> The representation of work as solely one's own when in fact it is the result of a joint effort.
- c. <u>Cheating on In-Class Exams</u> The covert gathering of information from other students, the use of unauthorized notes, unauthorized aids, etc.
- d. <u>Unauthorized Advance Access to an Exam</u> The representation of materials prepared at leisure, as a result of unauthorized advance access (however obtained), as if it were prepared under the rigors of the exam setting. This misrepresentation is dishonest in itself even if there are not compounding factors, such as unauthorized uses of books or notes.
